

Creative Commons

Most pictures on the World Wide Web belong to someone and cannot be used, especially in work that is published by someone else.


There is a system called “Creative Commons”, which allows pictures to be used, often with the picture being attributed (clearly mentioning who they belong to) to the owner.

Insert Images in a Webpage




First, find a suitable image of your own or one you are free to use, and save to a folder on your network.

Click on Insert, Image


Click on Upload Images and navigate to the folder in which your image is saved.

Click OK to load the image onto the webpage.



Format an Image

Click on the image to bring up the formatting menu.


